James Dillon, fifty-one years old, was killed at Harrisburg, Mo., when he stepped back into Opara mine No. 9 just as a blast was being made.

Ten persons were reported killed in a wreck on the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad between Windsor and Calhoun, Mo.

The Philadelphia mint turned out 507,000,000 cents in the last fiscal year. Raymond T. Baker, director of the United States mint, gave out the figures after inspecting the institution.

Arthur Patlarche, former vice president of the Pere Marquette railroad, died at Detroit, Mich., after a three months' illness. He was seventy-one years of age.

A conference of Republican party clubs, convened at Marion, O., to shape a speaking schedule for Senator Harding, adjourned after a session of several hours without completing the task.

Gov. James M. Cox and Senator Harding will speak from the same platform at the Ohio state fair at Columbus, August 31.

Honorable prevention of war by "the attainment of reason rather than of force" was urged by Governor Cox in an address opening the Democratic presidential nominating national speaking tour at Camp Perry, O.

The armed cruiser Pittsburgh and a destroyer have been ordered to the Baltic sea by the Washington government to protect American interests there.

The latest scale committee of operators and miners of the central competitive bituminous coal fields, comprising Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and western Pennsylvania, adjourned since at Cleveland, O., without reaching a settlement after having been in session five days.

Identification of the federal amendment was completed through favorable action on the part of the Tennessee lower house. The vote in the lower house was 41 to 23 in favor of the amendment.

The Ohio public utilities commission at Columbus refused to permit rate increases in the state to raise passenger rates 20 per cent, milk rates and excess baggage charges 20 per cent.

Leon Trotsky, soviet minister of war, issued a call at Moscow for service on the southern front.

The Polish have captured Novosibirsk, a short distance east of Warsaw, according to a dispatch from the Polish capital.

A Berlin dispatch says French troops clashed with the inhabitants of the town of Batschitz, an important mining town of Upper Silesia, 20 persons being killed and 24 wounded.

A Kingston dispatch says in consequence of the alarming development of chicken pox in various parts of Jamaica there is a likelihood that the prince of Wales will not carry out his proposed visit to the colony.

Admiral Huse, commanding all American naval forces in European waters, received instructions to proceed from London to Danzig.

President Wilson is ready to recognize the president of the Mexican government if the latter agrees to terms set forth in a proposal by Secretary Colby. It is reported at Mexico City.

The French foreign office at Paris says Chief of Staff Pilsudski, commanding the Polish forces at Warsaw, claims important gains for his armies everywhere and unopposed Warsaw was saved.

England earnestly desires peace, but could not accept transfer terms involving disarmament in any form. Prince Eugene, Spholn, minister of foreign affairs at Warsaw, told a correspondent.

Soviet Russia intends to seek an alliance with Germany to make war on France, and, if this is successful, to undertake a conquest of England and eventually American officials of the bolshevik regime told a correspondent at Kolno, Poland.

FIGHT FOR VOTES IS WON BY WOMEN

Thirty-Six States Have Ratified Amendment.

TENNESSEE FALLS INTO LINE

Washington is the thirty-fifth state to ratify the amendment. It was the first to do so since Tennessee in 1901.

Washington, American women have won their fight for votes. Washington and Tennessee have ratified the constitutional amendment, making 36 states out of 48.

Upon the opening March 22 of the special sessions of the legislatures of Washington and Delaware, the woman suffrage amendment in the United States was briefly tried.

The amendment to the Constitution passed by congress June 4, 1919, as drafted in 1875 by Susan B. Anthony, the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or

abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex. Ratification necessary by legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

Amendment ratified by 34 states, beginning with Wisconsin, June 10, 1919, and ending with West Virginia, March 10, 1920. Constitutional ratification before the United States Supreme court.

Amendment defeated by six states between September 12, 1919, and February 17, 1920, as follows, in the order named: Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland.

Connecticut and Vermont—No regular sessions until 1921. Governors had refused to call special sessions.

Florida and Tennessee—Cannot vote in 1920 because of constitutional provision requiring election to intervene before submission of amendment and action on it.

Louisiana—Legislature to meet in June, small hope of ratification.

North Carolina—Legislature to meet in special session in August. Gov. Thomas W. Bickett had declared his intention to ask for ratification.

Washington promptly ratified. Delaware and Louisiana refused. The governors of Connecticut, Florida and Vermont refused to call special sessions.

The United States Supreme court upheld the Ohio ratification on the ground that no state constitution had the authority to change in any detail the method which the United States Constitution itself provides for its amendment. This decision cleared the way for the special session in Tennessee, which began August 3.

It is seventy years since the organization of the League of Women Voters was begun in the United States.

In 1848 Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton called the first Woman's Rights convention at Seneca Falls, N. Y.

Stanton and Miss Anthony leaders and headquarters in New York. American Woman Suffrage association, with Mary A. Livermore, Julia Ward Howe and Lucy Stone—leaders and headquarters in Boston. The line of division was this: The former wished to concentrate on the passage of a constitutional amendment; the latter was in favor of obtaining the suffrage through amendments to state constitutions.

In 1890 the two organizations were united under the name of National American Woman Suffrage Association, and work was pushed along both lines of endeavor.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

NAMES: T. Howard son of J. Wesley Howard and Marie Irene Howard was born June 27 1860 near Dexter in Butler County Ky. He was reared on a farm and attended the public schools in which he closely applied himself until he was 16 years of age at which time he opened his public career as a rural school teacher.

He was both student and teacher from that date until he was admitted to the Bar in Morgantown, Ky. in the year 1883. After that date Positions of trust and honor were bestowed upon him in rapid succession. He was elected County Attorney in the year 1886 succeeding in himself, serving a second term. He was elected to the State Legislature in the year 1895. When the U. S. declared war against Spain in the year 1898 he volunteered with a Co. of his native boys served through and was mustered out with the ranks of Captain. In the year 1899 he was elected State Senator. In the year 1903 he was elected District Attorney. In the Legal Arena his rank was high as a prosecuting lawyer he was fearless to an unflinching degree not withstanding that he tempered all arguments with the laws of Justice written in the Divine Book, as a defender he was full of resources searching the Avenue his client had took.

Seeking to find a robe of justification for the accused. When dealing with issues of Parliamentary Nature he was able to cope with the best. On what ever subject approached his opinions were an index of his mental vigor. In Politics he was a staunch Republican standing face front at all times ready to do battle for his party. As a speaker he was forceful, eloquent and logical, as a citizen he was patriotic in the fullest sense. When our Country entered the World War he gave unstintingly of his time, labor and means. So all his energies to forward the cause to make the World Safe for Democracy he loved that freedom and flag for which his father had fought. He was a true hearted man with a big disposition Neighborly, tender and sympathetic. He loved the beautiful, true and good.

It was truthfully said of him "There was not a cruel fiber in his nature." He was an ardent supporter of educational Progress, and always ready to lend a hand in the up building of his County, his last public speech was at Beaver Dam, Ky. the latter part of May 1919 in behalf of "Good Roads." He was a born leader and ranked as such among his fellow citizens for 60 years. He was one of the organizers and was a stock holder in the Green River Republican.

when it was established in the year 1855, and was a faithful supporter and contributor to the paper till his death. He had been a member of the Missionary Baptist Church for 50 years and loved his church and its work. Above everything in this world he faithfully gave time and strength, heartily assisting the auxiliaries. He was married to Miss Mattie Tyler, April 24 1887, they immediately established their home on Tuley Street, where they reared their family and all their joys and sorrows have been spent. While we know of things are in the hand of "Him who doeth all things well," it seems from a human standpoint unsurprisingly sad that a man with a capacity for so much good should be called from amongst his fellow associates.

The primary cause of Capt. Howard's sickness and death was a nervous disorder of several years standing, coupled with that was a derangement of direction. On June 13, 1919 he suffered a complete breakdown. While he was, strictly speaking, never bedridden, he in no degree, at any time, recovered his normal state of health. He had been in the Norton Infirmary since last March, where he fought to regain his health with that same dauntless courage which had kept the sails on his work of life in proper setting as he passed down the stream of time. Altho he was in a weakened condition, death came somewhat unexpectedly from bowel hemorrhage, on Sunday morning August 15, 1920. The body was brought home on Monday accompanied by his son in law and daughter Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Keown. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Baptist church conducted by the pastor, Rev. R. B. Neel. Judge McKinzie Mess paid him high tribute in a beautiful and touching eulogy, basing his remarks on his association with Capt. Howard as a Lawyer, Statesman and citizen. A full demonstration of the esteem in which he was held by his fellow country men was evidenced by the great throng of people who crowded the church house and yard, children who loved him, young men and who had received kindly advice, old men and women whose friends he had been in days past, men bent by the weight of years who had been his fathers comrades during the Civil war, men who had marched under the flag with he as their Captain, men who had gone "overseas" under the same flag with his son.

The burial services were conducted by the Masons with interment in the Morgantown Cemetery. Capt. Howard is survived by his widow and five children, Mrs. R. E. Keown, Mrs. H. W. Jones, Misses Dorcie and Ruby Howard and Mr. Enid Howard. Thus ends the last chapter in the life of one of Butler Countys most noted men.

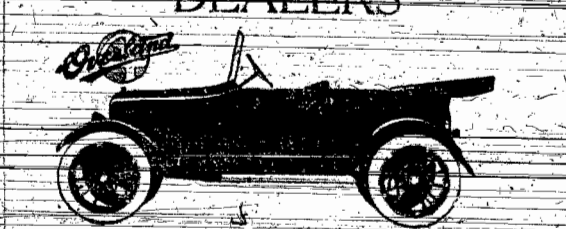

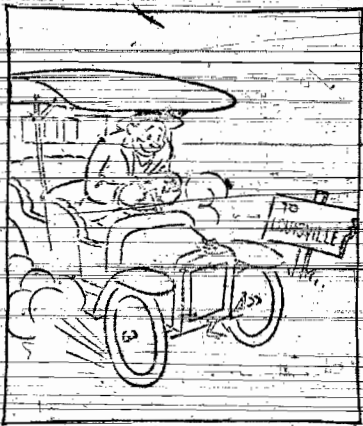

NOTICE is hereby given that on the 4th day of Sept. 1920, an election will be held at the Cromwell school house at which there will be submitted to the legal voters of the districts of Cromwell, Oak Grove and Graham, numbers of which are respectively 5-1, 4-20 and 2-4, the question of whether a tax shall be levied up on the taxable property in said districts above named for the expenses of transportation of pupils to and from a consolidated school at or near Cromwell.
